I. CALL TO ORDER, INVOCATION, AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Weaver called the meeting to order, Dr. Paul Thompson gave the invocation and Public Works Director Rob Fravel led the Pledge of Allegiance.

II. DISCUSSION / APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Mayor Weaver asked for a motion to approve the agenda. A motion was made by Councilmember Nobles, seconded by Councilmember Waters and passed unanimously.

III. PUBLIC COMMENTS:

This is the time we set aside for our citizens to comment on matters. We welcome and appreciate your comments or suggestions. Our purpose is to listen to what you tell us, and we will certainly take any comments you make under advisement. We do not answer questions at this time, nor do we reply to your statements at this time. The reason for this is that an individual council member cannot and should not attempt to commit the entire council to any position, and the council should not respond until it has all the information available on a specific matter.

Ground Rules:

- To be placed on the agenda, you must make your request to the City Clerk or City Manager by noon on the **Thursday** prior to the meeting. If a holiday falls around the meeting date, the deadline will be noon on **Wednesday** prior to the meeting day.
- Your comments are limited to five (5) minutes.

- If you have a complaint about an employee of the city, please discuss it with the City Manager first. The City Manager will advise the Council of the matter, and an executive session may be scheduled to discuss personnel issues.
- You should avoid making any slander or defamation of someone's character or reputation. If such comments are made, there can be legal consequences that follow since this is a public meeting.
- We prefer that you address matters that this council has the authority to deal with.

Mayor Weaver stated, "Move on to item number three: public comments. Now I'm going to turn this over to Mr. Johnson, our city attorney. For the people who haven't been coming to our meetings, generally the city attorney handles all of the public comments. So, Mr. Johnson.

Mr. Johnson replied, "Thank you, Mayor. As the agenda indicates, public comments are limited to five minutes per person in order to be on the agenda for submitting public comments, you had to have submitted your request Thursday of last week. We ask that everyone proceed in order. I am the timekeeper and I charged my phone this afternoon, brought my charger to work just for this purpose, just try to keep it civil. uh Try not to defame someone's character or their reputation. If you have a specific complaint against a city employee, we just try to ask that you talk to the city manager first, before you call us. Names appear on the agenda are going to be allowed to speak tonight. You're going to be limited to five minutes. With that being said, we'll proceed in order. I believe the first individual is Councilman Nobles."

Councilmember Nobles stated, "Yes, sir. I am not speaking today in interest of time as I saw how many people were speaking today."

Pastor Reba King Feliciano:

"Good evening. I am the Reverend Doctor Reba King Feliciano, one of the pastors in Ward One. I am here on behalf of City Council Lady Pastor Cynthia Miller, and as you know, the Bible tells us to everything there is a season, and I am strongly believing, That the season for those who were involved in this situation is up. The Bible says, "Let brotherly love continue." It's very obvious that this council and those involved are not willing to continue in brotherly love. They are no longer willing to serve the people of this city, because in the meetings that I've attended, we had representation from each ward. So, that's why I'm here today because we need more transparency, more honesty. You have broken the trust of the citizens and of the taxpayers. Sometimes when you break a rubber band, you can't put it back together. This brokenness cannot be repaired with this mayor and those involved. It's very obvious. You see, I was born and raised in Ward One, in order to understand the fight that we have had to have in Ward One. You would have had to live there. Some people say they are afraid to come in Ward One, but we have found them there in the nighttime. Ward One has truly been neglected by this administration, even administrations in the past. This strategy that just recently happened, I call it a trick. It's one of the oldest ones in the book. I'm really not surprised that it took place because it's been going on for a very long time. My daddy fought these same battles that we are still fighting now to get sidewalks and curbs and gutters, streets paved, the very same things. So, I do believe that your season is up for serving. Apology is in order.

Jo Ann Anderson:

Thank you, Reba. That's a hard speech to follow. But I'll see if I can't piggyback on what you've already said. Yes, I am Joanne Anderson. Good evening, everyone. I stand before you tonight as a concerned citizen who is deeply troubled by reports and the video footage that appeared to show Mayor Bernie Weaver, Councilmember Mark Nobles, Tammy Waters, Greg Janeczek, alphabets engaging in discussions of city business after an official city meeting had ended. If what the public has seen is accurate, then this was not simply poor judgment. It was a betrayal of the public trust. The people of Glennville elected these officials. To conduct the people's business openly and transparently, we need not elect them. We did not elect them to hold conversations behind closed doors outside the public view, or in a manner that appears to circumvent the spirit of open government. Citizens have a right to know how decisions are being discussed and made. Even more disturbing are the reports that derogatory comments were made about respected members of our community. One was even described as a terrorist because of his ethnicity. If that statement was made, it is unacceptable, offensive, and beneath the dignity of the public office. No citizen should be targeted, stereotyped or ridiculed because of their heritage or background. Likewise, reports that this that disparaging remarks were made toward Congresswoman I mean Councilwoman Cynthia Miller, I'm speaking it into existence are deeply concerning. Every elected official deserves to be treated with professionalism and respect regardless of disagreements.

What angers many citizens is not just what was allegedly said, but what these actions revealed. They suggest arrogance. They suggest a belief that accountability does not matter. They suggest that some elected officials have forgotten that they work for the people, not the other way around. The citizens of Glennville deserve answers. We deserve transparency. We deserve leaders who understand that public service is a privilege, not an entitlement. Many residents are disappointed, embarrassed, and outraged by what they've seen. The burden is now on those involved to explain their actions, accept responsibility where appropriate, and demonstrate why they should continue to hold positions of public trust. The people of this community are watching. We are paying attention, and we expect you to do better. We do expect you to do better. I am going to take all of my one minute and twenty seconds, and let the mayor know how deeply disappointed I was in seeing you on film. Let Tammy Waters know how deeply disappointed. Let Greg. Just you're going to have to teach me on your last name. Let Mark know how deeply disappointed I was. This was not a surprise to me, but you know, one thing I do like that. Now we have proof of the business and the way that you conducted it. You are untrustworthy. You don't deserve the positions of which you were elected. You should resign. You should resign, and if you don't resign, let me tell you publicly the citizens of Glennville, let's call for that's recall. We can do it. It's not in their power; they can't put they're not going to punish themselves. We can recall them from their positions. How much more time do I have? In my twenty seconds, I do want to say I noticed that on the on the agenda that there is a vacancy on the housing authority. I want to throw my hat in the ring for that position. Because I feel like I can serve Glennville on the housing authority, I can serve Glennville in any position. So let be warned, we see you. We see each and every one."

Ajani Abdul-Khaliq:

"Oh, it's tense in here. All right, starting my timer here, Mr. Mayor, members of the council, everybody out there, a little bit of a change of pace. I wanted to propose support for an AI

committee on telemedicine and actually a lot of it is led by the citizens. I had a whole bunch of things prepared, but let me just give you the short version. I work in software engineering. The future is bearing down upon us. I was having a conversation with AI Copilot everybody's voting and I was like, okay, I want to do my candidate research. I want to learn everything. So, tell me who everyone is all sides everything. And specifically, what do the citizens of Glenville actually need so that I don't get distracted by, you know, people running, they make all kinds of promises. Here's what it told me it said that we need economic opportunity We need certain areas need broadband. We've got some, and then we also need better health care access. I was surprised. So, I asked Copilot. I said, well, man that seems like a lot. It's giving me all kinds of strategies you could build this committee. There is all kinds of research and things like that. I mean I am just one person how do I do it? Especially you know don't have a city office or anything like that, and it said, well, you'd be surprised. Georgia actually has infrastructure already in place for funding and things like this. And these committees are started by citizens. It's actually easier to do it because of taxpayer money and things. Really, what I came here to speak to is partly you, but mostly y'all, all of us and everyone out there. We still have to prepare for the future and still have to be able to I know everybody's. We're in some trying times here. It's really obvious, but there's so much in terms of opportunity, and then there's some basics. Sometimes, you know people are kind of like AI and tech, or oh my god, it's moving so fast, this is one of those occasions where we can actually use the high- tech stuff to help strengthen the communities that we already know and love. So, I wanted to just tell you who it said was needed for such a committee. I was like, man, it looks like it's, it's uh, who are they? Thirty people? Fifty people over the course of these three committees because they all overlapped. An AI committee on telemedicine would essentially be a way to use. guess the web to hook up with Georgia Southern University because apparently, they already have some programs for this. And what is needed is a healthcare worker, a school representative, an EMC or tech person. Not sure what EMC is, a chamber or a business leader, a faith leader, a community volunteer, someone from GSU and a county representative. It's rotating. It's only eight people. It's one of those things to where you can bring people together to put all stuff going on out there aside and actually help ourselves, help our kids, help our people. Some of us really need this health care access, right? So, what I was going to ask you, should such a committee be started by citizens and anybody who is interested in this, please find me. I am around. You know, we show up every month to these meetings and we can get something started. And Copilot even told me the letter that we could write to Georgia Southern University just to introduce ourselves. If such a committee is built, then we would just ask for the support of everyone council elected officials, just everyone because it's something that the community needs".

Nicole Downing:

Did not show up to talk

Roger Nelson on behalf of GAMA (Georgia Area Ministerial Association)

"My name is Roger Nelson. I have been a citizen of Glenville for thirty-nine years. I live in Ward Three, and I am privileged to serve as a pastor in this community. I am also currently a member of

the Glennville Area Ministerial Association, as many of these pastors are that are here with me tonight, also known as GAMA. GAMA has never spoken at one of these meetings before. We have generally been content to focus on our mission of serving those in need, praying for our community and gathering our churches across denominational lines for worship and fellowship. None of us wanted to be here tonight. As pastors, we would much rather spend our time serving the hurting, praying for our city, and building unity in our community. But there are moments when silence becomes its own form of compromise, and we believe this is one of those moments. We come tonight reluctantly, but we are compelled by our conscience and by our understanding of the gospel. We are here tonight because we believe that what was reported and recorded from the April twenty eighth gathering was deeply harmful to our community, was beneath the standards of public office, and contrary to the teachings of Jesus Christ. Since the earliest centuries, The Christian faith of our Christian faith baptismal vows have included a profession of faith and a renunciation of evil and injustice. As Christian leaders in this community, we believe that words matter. Words shape actions. They shape culture and they shape trust. The comments publicly reported from that meeting, including comments about a local Muslim businessman, statements suggesting that Christians should exclusively do business only with Christians, Comments diminishing a fellow minister of the gospel by relating her to a satanic church, and dismissive remarks towards fellow public servants. These things brought pain, embarrassment and division. To our community, Citizens should never have to question whether they will be treated differently simply because of their religion, their political views, or their personal backgrounds. Public office is a sacred trust, and when that trust is broken, the damage extends far beyond one meeting or one news story. Glennville is better than this. We are a small town made up of people who know one another, care for one another, and depend upon one another. We worship in different churches. We hold different political views and we come from different backgrounds, but every single citizen deserves dignity, fairness and equal treatment under the law. As pastors and Christian leaders, we believe the teachings of Jesus Christ call us to love our neighbor, to speak truthfully, to reject prejudice and treat every person as someone made in the image of God. What was heard on those recordings does not reflect those teachings. This is not about partisan politics. It is about character. It is about public trust. It is about moral responsibility that is carried by those we entrust with leadership. We believe that the restoring of public trust requires meaningful accountability. Giving the circumstances surrounding these events, it is difficult for us to see how confidence can be revealed rebuilt while those involved hold on to their positions. This is not said lightly, as pastors we believe deeply in grace, repentance, forgiveness and redemption. But repentance also requires accountability. Leadership requires integrity, and public trust once it is severely damaged as it has been, is extraordinarily difficult to restore. We want to help set a new standard for our future leaders, one that is marked by integrity, accountability and the rebuilding of trust within this community. Tonight, we are asking you for a better path forward for our city. Our prayer tonight is not for humiliation or vengeance but for trust, Repentance, wisdom, accountability, and healing for this great city. May God bless Glennville. May Christ teach us to love our neighbors better. And may the Holy Spirit guide all of us to truth, justice, and peace.”

Deandrea Youngblood:

“Good evening everyone. My name is Deandrea Youngblood, and I am a resident of Glennville, Georgia and I am here to formally request for live streaming and archiving of recorded videos for all Glennville city council meetings. Glennville is falling behind the standard of local governments across Georgia and the nation. For instance, the Georgia State Election Board streams all of its meetings live on YouTube. Atlanta's city council meetings, they maintain a full video archive of all their meetings, freely accessible to the public. Peachtree City holds council meetings that are publicly streamed and documented. Indiana has passed a state law requiring all government meetings to be live streamed or recorded. Nationally, cities utilizing interactive live streaming report higher levels of civic participation. And increased satisfaction with local government responsiveness. And these are not large, resource rich cities operating with unlimited budgets. Many of these are small and mid-sized communities that chose to prioritize transparency because they understand it is the foundation of public trust. Research and real-world implementation consistently show that streaming and recording public meetings can one Bridge the gap between governance and the governed, promoting informed citizenship and shared public responsibility. It can enhance accessibility for shift workers, parents, seniors with mobility challenges, and anyone who cannot attend a meeting in person. It can again rebuild and maintain public trust and deter violations of the Open Meetings Act by creating an automatic continuous record of proceedings. It reaches younger, tech-savvy residents who engage through digital platforms rather than in-person attendance. And it costs little to nothing. For instance, Facebook Live and YouTube Live are free tools already available on any smartphone. And so I am asking the Glennville City Council to adopt a policy requiring all regular and special - called council meetings to be video recorded. Commit to live streaming those recordings via Facebook Live, YouTube or another accessible platform. Archive these past recordings on the city's website, along with the agendas and minutes, consistent with best practices in government transparency. While some may argue that citizens can simply file an open records request, that process can take time. Create unnecessary barriers to access and place additional administrative burdens on the local government. Archive recordings provide immediate access to what occurred during a meeting, in allowing the public to stay informed without having to navigate a formal records request process. The O C G A section fifty fourteen zero one guarantees open meetings. Recording and streaming is the modern responsible extension of that guarantee. And one that is long overdue for the city of Glennville. Thank you for your time and service to this community.”

Ashley Knapp:

“Sorry, I'm very nervous, so if I stutter or shaking, I'm sorry but I did feel it in my heart. That God told me to be here. Mr. Bernie, I've known you for years, But I really am disappointed in what happened with the mayor and the council meeting behind people's back. Y'all made fun of it, but y'all knew it was wrong. Y'all sat there and made jokes when you knew it was wrong and I have to say, I also felt it on my heart on Sunday when, our preacher mentioned the sermon on the salt of the earth. We all know we don't want to lose our flavor in the salt of the earth. And y'all were judging, I am sorry, y'all were judging another person based on their Christianity, their faith, while

y'all weren't exactly living up to being faithful Christians yourself. I feel like a lot of people in this town are scared to come forward because I have noticed. There are some anonymous cowards who post things on like Facebook and stuff like that, and they are they have no problem digging out your skeletons. But some people see those skeletons as testimonies. We've all had days where we've been less than perfect by all means. I don't think Mr. Bernie and them are bad people by all means, but I think that if you and I break the law, we're held accountable. You all have broken the law, and it's y'all have to be held accountable to. And I am not saying burn the stakes or anything like that, because rumor has it, there is a burn ban. So, no worries, we won't be doing that. So, I'm just joking, but um I think this community like truly loves each other. I think they truly care about each other. And I think everybody, I don't think anybody wants to ruin anyone's lives over this tonight. I think everyone wants to see justice. I think everyone wants to see the mayor and the council up here being held to the same standards. Is if this person right here, that's right, that's right, cause if she breaks the law, she's going to get a ticket. Yeah. So it's just about accountability in this town. And I think no one should ever be afraid to speak up when something is wrong. It doesn't matter who you are, it doesn't matter if you're an employee of the city. I think everyone, if wrong is wrong. Put it out there and stand up for what's right. And if I'm wrong, y'all correct me. So I think also moving forward, be a little bit more transparent with the people. There's some things that I noticed online that kind of had me questioning and maybe y'all can correct it. You see stuff like the audit posted online, but you don't see the budget. It may be that it just hasn't been posted, but you see two years' worth of it. So, it just makes you as taxpayers wonder where's your money going towards? You know what I mean? And we deserve to know because we see the money being spent, but we deserve to know what it was put towards too. Because I get up and my husband gets up, and we both work hard in this community to pay our bills, to pay our taxes, to pay our water bills as anyone else does. So, just a little bit more transparency going forward. And I know somebody was questioning also about what happened with the Knights case and why that was dropped because it seems to be like it was a lot of money. The lawsuit was dropped from my understanding. So, but I could be wrong on that. Just being more transparent and being held accountable, held accountable, just like you would anybody else in here? That's what I have to say."

Donna Blocker:

"I have a different view on this than everybody else. I've read and listened to the commentary from so many different people over the past few weeks, and again tonight. When the video was released, I too was angry and wanted to see punishment. But the more I listen to the critics, I realize that the loudest voices don't want peace. They are profiting off their own agenda and keeping the pot stirred. Some have personal access to grind, and they are using this opportunity to retaliate. Then there are those who are on the opposite side of the political spectrum and are hoping for a chance to replace the mayor and council with more like - minded people. But I've also heard from people who voted for every single person up here, and they appreciate the hard work of our council and mayor. I would encourage everyone to look at the past few years, at the overall record of these members, and what they have provided to our community, under their leadership, we have achieved and maintained a fully staffed police department. We got a grant for a K nine, who since

twenty twenty-three, has yielded two hundred and eighty felony drug arrests, just felony drug arrests that doesn't even include the misdemeanor drug arrests. Training for that K nine and the officer that has the K nine, we have avoided a millage rate increase for at least the past five years, maintained a financial surplus and had very positive audits. All of these people have worked to safeguard taxpayer dollars and keep the city safe and the employees of this city. I do not believe that anyone should be judged solely by their worst moment. We are all human, and sometimes we say things we wish we could take back. I know I surely have. What matters most is how we respond when we make mistakes. The comments that were made have been acknowledged and they have apologized and in a world where accountability is rare, I think it's important to recognize this is my five minutes. I think it's important to recognize when someone acknowledges their mistakes and attempts to make things right. Can anybody in this room say that they haven't done the exact same thing that happened up here? Not a single none of y'all can say that you haven't told anything about. As citizens, we should definitely expect our elected officials to conduct themselves professionally and respectfully. At the same time, we should also allow room for forgiveness and redemption. Good leadership is not the absence of mistakes. It is the willingness to learn from them, accept responsibility, and continue serving the public with integrity. As we move forward, let's hope like Doctor Thompson said. We all need to focus on what is best for this city. Extend some grace where it is warranted, and remember that effective public service should be evaluated by the entirety of a record, not by a single regrettable moment. Thank you."

Mayor Weaver tabled this item until someone could tell the Planning and Zoning Commission what the property was going to be used for.

Councilmember Nobles:

"I'd like to thank everybody for coming out. I'd like to particularly thank the young lady who spoke about live streaming our meetings. I think that's a very good idea. Thank you for that suggestion. Have a good night."

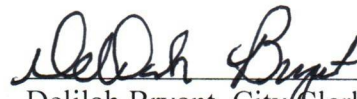
With all items being handled Mayor Weaver adjourned the meeting.
